Uncontacted App



Within the app, the students have the option to find all the different chapters, that are part of the book. Through that, they have the possibility to learn more about the individual chapters, as some texts are shortened within the book. Furthermore, it is possible, to find information on current events, which can not be added to the textbook that easily.

After clicking on one chapter, the student can choose from different topics, depending on the content belonging to each chapter. Depending on the student's learning preference, the content can then be shown in different styles. This is an example of the animations within the app. They are supported by a voice-over and important facts in form of text. The animations can be clicked through, paused or repeated whenever needed.





Another option for the students is to choose a text-based preference. Here, the different information is portrayed in form of text, but still supported by small animations, to connect the understanding of both. The students can then swipe through the chapter, to learn more about the other topics as well.



Furthermore, students have the possibility to answer specific questions about each of the chapters. Those work similar to exercises within textbooks. After answering a question, the students can also see the answer of their classmates and therefore can be connected, even without being in school, and see other viewpoints as well.





The students can also take a look at a full list of all different uncontacted tribes. After clicking on one of them, it takes them to a new page from where they can learn more about the different tribes' lifestyles, locations, histories and the individual threats each tribe has to face.

The map is another way of discovering the different tribes. For this, the students can scroll through a world map and zoom in on the areas where tribes live. By clicking on one of the tribes' locations, it takes them to the specific tribe and more information about it. This makes it possible for the students to get a better understanding of the actual living spaces of uncontacted tribes.
