My advice for other students is to enjoy their time at university as much as they can.



Tell us a bit about your final project. (right) For my final major project, I realised a Titanic Museum & Recreation Centre. The proposed development is situated in Southampton, in the popular waterside Mayflower Park, next to the dock where the Titanic embarked in 1912. The client, Southampton City Council, was keen to promote an acknowledgement of Titanic's history, as the tragedy eventually defined the history of the city too. The Titanic Museum & Recreation Centre aims to become the new iconic landmark of Southampton, with an imposing and impacting design which will contribute to honouring the memory of the deceased and, at the same time, symbolise the famous cruise ships that are making history in the Port of Southampton. Many different facilities and services have been designed in order to guarantee an enjoyable experience for both residents and visitors of all ages and interests.

Tell us a bit about your job.

I'm a design manager so my main role is managing design teams to complete a project in the best way possible. I could be driving to site for design team meetings with architects and engineers or, depending on the stage that a project is at, working in the office on drawings and making sure they are compliant. I also work on bids and tenders to win more work, and check projects to make sure they are financially viable in terms of buildability.

How do you feel Solent helped you reach your career goals?

Solent really helped me reach my career goals. It's amazing how the course that I studied part-time over five years has completely linked into my work. Every year, what I learnt at university, I then went out on site and it was there, so it really aided me in my understanding in my workplace. Working full-time also enabled me to put my knowledge from my job into my assignments, so it was very beneficial.


What's next for you?

I have been studying part-time for the last five years while working full-time, so having completed my degree I will now focus on continuing my development and progression at work and look to achieve CIOB chartered membership.

What advice would you give to other students or anyone wanting to do a degree in construction?

Ask questions! If you are unsure of anything, the best thing to do is ask — especially when it comes to assignments, to make sure you write what is expected of you. Also, don't leave anything to the last minute. It's useful to be able to show your work to your lecturer regularly — and weeks in advance of your submission date — to ensure you're on the right track and can make any necessary changes, so that you get the best mark you possibly can.

What's next for you?


I am already in full-time employment as I have undertaken my degree on a part-time basis. Although my knowledge and skill base are already of a certain level — having spent nine years practising in industry — Solent gave me a broader perspective of the industry as a whole and provided me with the tools I need to progress into a management role within my current company.

Please share any advice you have for other students or potential students.

Get into a working practice ASAP!! Even if it's on a voluntary basis, evenings, weekends, one day per week, etc. The knowledge you learn within practice is invaluable and will be transferable onto your degree course. That's not to say that Solent doesn't provide this also – it's simply that the more experience you can gain as a postgraduate, the better prospects you will have after graduating.

Tell us a bit about your final project and your key findings.

My project is based at the Winter Gardens site in the centre of Bournemouth. The client is Hyatt, more specifically Hyatt Regency. It is a 14-storey hotel complex with undercroft parking for both hotel guests and the public. Bournemouth's current need for parking meant that the removal of the existing car park on the site would be of detriment to the town and therefore this needed to be re-incorporated into the design. The hotel boasts two restaurants, several bars, a pool and spa area, and bedrooms, which consist of standard rooms, junior suites, executive suites and a presidential suite.

BA (Hons) Interior Design Graduated 2019

What was it about architectural interior design that initially attracted you?

Since a young age, I have always had an interest in structures and how buildings look, both internally and externally. Interior design specifically caught my eye because it allowed me to get creative in order to solve a problem. I enjoy the challenge of integrating the space I am working with, the client's needs and the budget I am given, along with other factors — all skills which were gained through the interior design course. My key interest in interior design is not only how a space initially looks but also key following factors such as whether the space works for the client's health and wellbeing, and future needs.

What were the best bits of your course?

The best bits of my course would have to be the variety of projects we got to work on — a mix of report writing, themed projects and live project designs, which were not only interesting, as I got to converse with clients, but also made me feel that I was officially an interior designer, which was the biggest highlight. The course also organised trips, which were fun but also helped me gain knowledge within the industry.

Tell us about your new job role.

I am currently working for an interior design company which specialises in designing for the health and wellbeing of their clients, which includes designing for those with dementia, such as care homes and residential projects. The job role mainly includes designing spaces with the concepts of colour, furniture and circulation in mind. I specifically focus on the design side, which involves the use of Sketch-Up and AutoCAD to present theme designs to the clients, along with going to client meetings to build mood and sample boards.

What were the top three things you learnt at Solent?


Solent taught me a lot throughout the three years. Primarily, I learnt about time management, via all the units that the course provided – with help from my lecturers and friends, it all combined to shape and strengthen me, and I would set myself deadlines, which is vital for the industry. Secondly, I also learnt how to be more independent – leaving my hometown and starting a new chapter at Southampton definitely helped my confidence in doing things independently. Thirdly, Solent taught me how to research properly – it is a highly

valued skill in many professions and, with the support of the job I took on at Solent as an architectural research assistant for the new sports building, my research skills have developed hugely and have opened up an interest in the academic world of interior design.

What advice would you give to those studying at Solent?

My advice to those studying at Solent is to ensure you keep yourself up-to-date with all deadlines, as it will not only help you along your course journey but also in the future in the industry, as organising your time management is a key skill which employers require. But most importantly, enjoy yourself at university – it's an experience like no other.

Tell us a bit about your role at Hyphen.

I work within a team that mainly specialises in data centre projects in and around Europe. I've also worked on some retail projects within the company, and a few commercial projects. My current role varies, depending on what stage the project is at. I could be working on planning drawings all week, then jump onto tender pack drawings or construction packs. I also pick up some projects at detail design stage, when I have to work on any detail drawings required for submittal or review. I've also been lucky enough to go out on site to assist colleagues in snagging completed projects before handover.

What do you enjoy most about the job?

The scope of projects is quite intriguing because one minute I could be working on a huge data centre site and the next on a small retail unit requiring an internal fit-out. There is always something new to learn with each project, no matter how big or small it is.

How do you feel your studies at Solent helped prepare you for your career?

My studies opened up the opportunity to work in this particular field. If not for my time at Solent, I would still be doing the same job I was doing before deciding to go to university, with no end result in sight.

What's next for you?

I intend to carry on working at Hyphen as I gain valuable experience within the industry and hopefully become an asset to the company. I will also be enrolling for the master's programme in architectural project management at Solent this September. I'm hoping that this programme will create more opportunities for me within both the company and the industry at large.

What advice would you give to students wanting to follow in your footsteps?


