

Why did you decide to study this course at Solent?

I started my career in construction in 2015 and when I started I had never heard of a quantity surveyor before. With the support of my employer I decided to further my knowledge of the job and the world of construction by going to university. I knew Solent had a very good quantity surveying and construction management course from speaking to people I work with, so I looked on the Solent website for more details and applied. I started my HNC in Quantity Surveying that September and graduated in 2017. Since then I have pushed myself further to receive my BSc in Construction Management. For this, I stayed with Solent University and continued to receive wonderful support from the lecturers who understand your needs and aspirations, and will go above and beyond to ensure you walk away from the University proud of what you have achieved and ready to succeed in your career.

What was your favourite part of the course, and what were the biggest challenges?

What was the biggest highlight of your studies?




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Jason Livingstone

Why did you choose Solent? How did Solent prepare you for your career?

The moment when I handed in my final major project along with my other classmates – the accumulation of three years' worth of projects, essays and presentations, alongside laughter, tears and friendship. It was a huge achievement for me, as someone who struggled with education throughout my life.

Tell us a little about your career story so far.

I am one of the lucky few who can say they got a position even before attending graduation! So far at Ted Baker I have jumped straight in at the deep end, designing concessions and pop-up events for the company.

Concession design is anything 'Ted' you see inside a department store – for example, Selfridges, John Lewis or even Galerie Lafayette in Paris. I've been working on projects in the UK, Spain, France, Ukraine and Germany, designing a range of store designs for both Men's and Women's. As part of the job role, each designer is the project manager for that project – so from concept to installation to the final details of props/styling onsite.

As a Ted designer, you have to be able to manage a number of projects at once, while communicating with suppliers, builders and department stores. I am so lucky to have been able to have an incredible start to the design world with such a well-known and respected brand as Ted Baker.

What is interior design decoration?

The process of design from concept to completion, encompassing everything from colour, lighting, fixtures and fittings to the finishing details.

What tips would you give to someone wanting a career in your industry?

Pick the right degree for you – a course that fits your needs, personality and interests. Without a fundamental understanding of the industry and a solid degree course, I think it would be difficult to gain access to the industry and sustain a long

career. Passion for the industry is something you can't fake – you have to absolutely love it. For anyone truly interested in the field, this will come naturally.

Design Manager, Kier Construction BSc (Hons) Construction Management, 2019

Tell us a bit about your role.

I'm a design manager so my main role is managing design teams to complete a project in the best way possible. I could be driving to site for design team meetings with architects and engineers or, depending on the stage a project is at, working in the office on drawings and making sure they are compliant. I also work on bids and tenders to win more work, and check projects to make sure they are financially viable in terms of buildability.

How do you feel Solent helped you reach your career goals?

Solent really helped me reach my career goals. It's amazing how the course I studied part-time over five years has completely linked into my work. Every year, what I learnt at university, I would then go out on site and it was there, so it really aided me in my understanding in my workplace. Working full-time also enabled me to put my knowledge from my job into my assignments, so it was very beneficial.

What's next for you?

I studied part-time for five years while working full-time, so having completed my degree I have been focusing on continuing my development and progression at work and looking to achieve CIOB chartered membership.

What advice would you give to other students or anyone wanting to do a degree in construction?

Ask questions! If you are unsure of anything, the best thing to do is ask – especially when it comes to assignments, to make sure you write what is expected of you. Also, don't leave anything to the last minute – it's useful to be able to show your work to your lecturer regularly – and weeks in advance of your submission date – to ensure you're on the right track and can make any necessary changes, so that you get the best mark you possibly can.

Edward Kercher

Architectural Technologist (ACIAT), ADAM Architecture BA (Hons) Architectural Technology, 2017

Tell us a bit about your role at ADAM Architecture.

I work directly with the project director and team to develop, manage and control the technical construction of a variety of projects covering the residential and commercial sectors. I have lots of experience helping to manage and design traditionally designed projects at all kinds of building/construction scales. I work closely with all of the consultant team, client and contractor (usually from RIBA stages 4–6), making sure the projects are delivered within the agreed programme and budget.

What do you enjoy most about working in your industry, and what are the biggest challenges?

The best part about working in architecture is that we create something physical that, if designed and constructed well, will last for generations to come. The fulfilment that you get at the end of a project, knowing that you played a part to produce a beautifully designed and executed building, makes the hard work worth it. We are all constantly using buildings every day of our lives, and knowing that you're a part of the construction of something so fundamental to life is incredible.

How do you feel your studies at Solent helped prepare you for your career?

Solent University gives you the foundations of knowledge to build a solid career within the construction industry. From units in construction to building industry programme training, law-dispute resolution and much more, every part of the course sets you up to be fully prepared to join the building industry as a competent, confident and informed practitioner. I would highly recommend the course to friends and family and do so regularly – the course leaders and access to up-to-date resources make it an enjoyable experience.

What advice would you give to students wanting to follow in your footsteps?

If I were to speak to myself after I graduated I would say get ready to carry on with the learning curve because it doesn't stop at university. Also, make sure that everything you do, produce and issue is to the highest standard. The primary attribute that an architectural technologist needs to perfect is his or her ability to notice the smallest discrepancies and mistakes in drawings before they're sent out to the wider team.

What's coming up for you?

I am currently working closely with a colleague at ADAM Architecture and Solent University to write a brief for students whereby we will be involved in regularly overseeing the students' work within the first-year final project module. We are excited to see how the first year plays out and what designs the students produce. Solent and ADAM Architecture have had a longstanding relationship which we hope flourishes into the future, creating lots of exciting opportunities for the students. Nadia Ponte

Kitchen Designer, Howdens BA (Hons) Interior Design, 2019

What was it about architectural interior design that initially attracted you?

Since a young age, I have always had an interest in structures and how buildings look, both internally and externally. Interior design specifically caught my eye because it allowed me to get creative in order to solve a problem. I enjoy the challenge of integrating the space I am working with, the client's needs and the budget I am given, along with other factors – all skills which were gained through the BA (Hons) Interior Design degree course. My key interest in interior design is not only how a space initially looks but also key following factors such as whether the space works for the client's health and wellbeing, and future needs.

What were the best bits of your course?

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The best bits of my course would have to be the variety of projects we got to work on – a mix of report writing, themed projects and live project designs, which were not only interesting, as I got to converse with clients, but also made me feel that I was officially an interior designer, which was the biggest highlight. The course also organised trips, which were fun but also helped me gain knowledge within the industry.

Tell us about your new job role.

I am currently working for an interior design company which specialises in designing for the health and wellbeing of it's clients, which includes designing for those with dementia,



such as care homes and residential projects. The job role mainly includes designing spaces with the concepts of colour, furniture and circulation in mind. I specifically focus on the design side, which involves the use of Sketch-Up and AutoCAD to present theme designs to the clients, along with going to client meetings to build mood and sample boards.

What were the top three things you learnt at Solent?

Solent taught me a lot throughout the three years. Primarily, time management via all the units the course provided and setting myself deadlines, which are vital for the industry. Secondly, I also learnt how to be more independent – leaving my hometown and starting a new chapter at Southampton definitely helped my confidence in doing things independently. Thirdly, Solent taught me how to research properly – it is a highly valued skill in many professions and, with the support of the job I took on at Solent as an architectural research assistant for the new sports building, my research skills have developed hugely and have opened up an interest in the academic world of interior design.

What advice would you give to those studying at Solent?

My advice to those studying at Solent is to ensure you keep yourself up-to-date with all deadlines, as it will not only help you along your course journey but also in the future in the industry, because organising your time management is a key skill which employers require. But most importantly, enjoy yourself at university – it's an experience like no other.






Tristan Salkeld

How do you feel your studies at Solent helped prepare you for your career?

What advice would you give to those wanting to follow in your footsteps?

Learn everything you can while at university – it's a great step for your career in the future, and the industry gets better and better as you go along.



Hayley Harding

Senior Project Manager, Mace BA (Hons) Interior Design, 2012

"This course is for you if you love a challenge, paired together with creativity."

How did university prepare you for your career?

University taught me the fundamentals I needed for the workplace to put the skills I had learnt into practice. I learnt about each component that makes up a project, from inception to completion, as well as how a business in this industry might operate. The course allowed me to grow in confidence, especially when presenting my ideas to an audience, something that has been crucial in my career progression and personal growth.

What has been your career highlight?

There are quite a few, but most recently I was trained to deliver mental health and wellbeing workshops titled 'Conversations for Health'. I was part of a group of 12 people who would deliver training to the entire organisation (6,000 people) on the importance of wellbeing. I love a challenge and it took me out of my comfort zone, but I've loved the experience. I'm able to engage with so many different people and hopefully have a positive impact in the world of mental health and wellbeing.

What are the biggest challenges of working in your industry?

Sometimes it can be a challenge to get your voice heard. However, just because your voice is not heard the first time, that doesn't mean it won't ever be heard. You often have to knock on many doors before one opens, but if you persevere, the opportunity is available to you. Often it's up to you to carve and shape – don't always expect it to be presented to you.

What tips would you give to someone wanting a career in your industry?

Be kind, be open-minded and learn to actively listen. Get involved in different parts of the industry, and don't be scared of moving around or asking to take on different tasks or roles – it's all part of the experience and will help shape where you want your career to go. Also, don't rush it. Enjoy the journey and be open to new experiences, even if they scare you. Say yes to things you think you might not be capable of – you might just surprise yourself... and what's the worst that can happen?
